Field trip to Arrallas Farm Summercourt



Ben Norwood the CATF secretary reports "After recording a great veteran oak in a wood pasture we made our way to an old trackway. Hollowed out ash, oaks, field maples and sycamores lined both sides of the track. Years of erosion had left exposed amazing root structures, which added to the gravity defying appearance of the former pollards and maiden trees. We then came across the most amazing ash tree situated in the middle of the field. The. as yet. unnamed tree initially looked like three separate stools, but, when we looked closely we realised they were all connected and one tree" Thanks to the Duchy of Cornwall who gave permission to access these on their tenanted dairy and cattle farms in a tranquil and unnoticed part of the county.



The Hollies of the Helford

Sue Scott and Ben Ellis ran a field trip in the South Helford area. Ben said We had a real adventure on our quest to record the trees at Frenchman's Creek. "The Holly trees are situated on the fringe of the creek and encircle a spring. It was too wet to make any records the first day so we returned the following day, which was much fairer enabling us to take in their full beauty. I found some Oyster mushrooms too! I then ventured over to admire the Manaccan Church Fig."

Along with a few new recruits we discovered a great veteran oak, hollies and beeches. All dwarfed now by some very large coast redwoods in the grounds of the house.

Opportunities for funding through the HLF are being explored and avenues for ATF involvement in the project. Eden is also working with Cornwall College Rosewarne to start a M. Res student on micro propagation using woody material. Rosewarne is still experimenting with some material from the Pontfadog Oak but so far has been unsuccessful in getting it to root.
